## Summary of Requirements for Proposed Curriculum Changes

**Note:** The decision to require a feasibility report and/or pro forma budget is made by the President's cabinet or senior leadership, based on a recommendation from the Provost's cabinet, at the time that the concept paper is approved. Feasibility reports are required only if the program has significant curricular implications. Pro-forma budgets are required if the program has significant financial or resource needs.

## Definitions

<u>Concentration</u> - one or more prescribed series of courses such that students have to take one or another, and can't mix and match. Effectively students have two or more mutually exclusive pathways to the degree, almost like separate degrees.

<u>Advising Concentration</u> - a collection of elective courses from which students can take related courses around a theme or can mix and match across areas, even if the areas are called "concentrations" in the College's catalog. They are basically a group of electives from which students can, with their advisers, work out the best selection. Also called a "specialization" or "context."
