
Campus Safety Authority

Upon completion of this training the Campus Security Authority (CSA) will understand the basic reporting requirements of the Clery Act and how to report Clery crimes to the Utica University Clery Coordinator.





History of the Clery Act



Named in memory of 19-year-old Lehigh University freshman Jeanne Ann Clery who was raped and murdered in her residence hall room on April 5, 1986.

Her parents believe she would have been more cautious if she had known about other violent crimes at Lehigh.

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act





History (continued)

The Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act (the "Clery Act") requires all colleges and universities participating in federal financial aid programs to keep and disclose information about crime on and near their respective campuses.



History (continued)

- 1988-Became law in Pennsylvania
- 1990-Became a federal law: *Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act; a*mended the Higher Education Act (HEA) of 1965
- 1998-Renamed "Jeanne Clery Disclosure of Campus Security Policy and Campus Crime Statistics Act" (aka the "Clery Act")
- 2000 & 2008-Amended as part of the Higher Education Opportunity Act (HEOA)
- 2013-Amended as part of the Violence Against



Purpose

Gather/publish de-identified crime data to:

 - Ensure students know about dangers on campus
 - Allow students and parents to compare colleges



Federal Monitoring and Penalties



- Compliance monitored by the Department of Education
- Civil penalties \$67,500/violation lacksquare
- Suspended Federal Student Financial Aid lacksquare



What are Campus Security Authorities

Campus Security Authorities (or "CSAs") is a Cleryspecific term that encompasses four groups of individuals and organizations associated with an institution who are responsible for reporting crimes under the Clery Act.





Who is a Campus Security Authority?

- **Campus Safety Officers** ${}^{\bullet}$
- Any individual who has responsibility for campus security but who are not Campus Safety **Officers:**
 - i.e.: Person responsible for monitoring entrance into institutional property.
- Any individual or organization specified in an institution's statement of campus security policy as an individual or organization to which students and employees should report criminal offenses.
- An official of an institution who has significant responsibility for student and campus activities, including, but not limited to, student housing, student discipline, and campus judicial proceedings.



Other Examples of CSA's

- * Inclusive of but not limited to:
- Student Judicial Programs or Other Discipline Officials (Conduct, DEI, • BRRN, BIT, etc.)
- Directors or Managers of Student Service Centers (Success Coaches, • Registrar, Admissions, etc.)
- **Director of Athletics**
- Athletic coaches/assistants/trainers •



Other Examples of CSA's

- * Inclusive of but not limited to:
- Dean of Students and staff
- SLCE employees
- Student community assistant
- Student who monitors access to residence halls
- Faculty or Staff advisor to a student group
- Faculty who hold office hours



Employees who are NOT CSA's

- * Inclusive of, but not limited to:
 - A faculty member with no responsibility beyond the classroom.
 - "Office hours" is considered outside the classroom
 - Pastoral and Professional Counselors
 - A licensed mental health counselor or a pastoral counselor working within the scope of their license or religious assignment.
 - Food service employees
 - Facilities services employees





Special Note to Counselors

- Even though counselors are not considered CSA'a and are not required to report Clery Crimes:
 - Utica University encourages reports of crimes by counselors and victims.
 - Additionally, explaining how to report a crime to Police or Campus Safety is encouraged.

CSA's must also report...

Arrests and referrals for disciplinary actions:

- Carrying and possessing weapons
- Illegal drug abuse
- Liquor law violations

Drunkenness and DUI do not count as a Liquor Law violation

Do NOT report violations of university policy as a Clery crime



What information do I provide?

- Encourage them to seek medical help lacksquare
- Sexual assault, domestic violence, ${\bullet}$ dating violence or stalking, CSA's are required by VAWA to provide:
 - Written resources for victims
 - Guidance on how to preserve evidence
 - A copy of "Resources" flyer

Utica University Title IX Resources

DEFINITIONS

Sexual Assault/Misconduc

Any sexual activity done without affirmative consent or with an individual under the age of 17 in New York.

Affirmative Consent

Affirmative consent is a knowing, voluntary and mutual decision among all participants to engage in sexual activity. Consent cannot be given when incapacitated by substances (alcohol, drugs, etc.), when being coerced or pressured, or otherwise being forced from the individuals.

Intimate Partner Violence (IPV)

Use of physical violence, coercion, threats, intimidation, isolation, or other forms of violence directed towards a person who is or has been in a social relationship of a romantic or intimate nature with another. IPV can be a single act or a pattern of behavior in relationships.

Stalking

Stalking refers to a course of knowingly unwanted conduct directed at a specific person that would cause a reasonable person to fear for that person's safety or the safety of others, or suffer substantial emotional distress.

How to get help following an incident:

1. Get to a safe place.

2. Get help. Consider telling someone you trust what has happened.

3. Contact one of the offices in this pamphlet to get support and talk about options. There are confidential and non- confidential resources in this pamphlet.

Confidential vs. Private

Confidential resources CANNOT share information without explicit consent from the student.


Exception: someone is threatening to harm themselves or others.

Private resources need to share information, with or without consent from the student.



Resources for Victims of Sexual Assault, Intimate Partner Violence and Stalking

Clery does not require reporting if:

- Do not report crimes to Clery Coordinator IF:
 - A person tells you about a crime that occurred BEFORE they came to Utica University; OR
 - While they were away from campus and not involved in a Utica University sanctioned event or activity.



What NOT to do:

- Do NOT try to determine whether a crime took place or who lacksquarewas at fault.
- Do NOT try to apprehend the alleged perpetrator of the crime ulletor action.
- Do NOT try to convince a victim to contact Law Enforcement if • the victim chooses not to do so.
- Do NOT identify the victim unless the victim consents to being • identified.



What is done with Clery Reports?

- The Clery Coordinator determines whether a crime is reportable under Clery.
- If reportable the identified crime is included as a statistic published each October in our Annual Security and Fire Safety Report.
- The ASR is available on the Campus Safety website and hard copies can be found in several offices on campus including the Campus Safety Office.





No, Campus Safety Officers are CSA's and they are responsible to report the incident to the Clery Coordinator.
