


Q: Tell me about how you are transitioning from your role as professor to interim dean of the School of Business and Justice Studies.

A: I've been the chair of Business and Economics for a number of years now, and have worked very closely with Dean James Norrie, the departing dean. He is sticking around until two great associate deans on both the business and justice studies sides. We have high quality programs and excellent faculty, so I'm confident that we will keep things progressing in the right direction. We have a number of initiatives that have been started under Dean Norrie's leadership that we are going to be continuing.



A: The move to the Clark City Center is very exciting. It benefits the College as a whole because we're busting at the seams and we need more space. The current faculty/staff stickers will expire on Aug 15, 2016. In order to keep your vehicle registration current, please visit:

www.utica.edu/finance/environment/safety/registration.cfm

Login using your Utica College credentials, and fill in the online form. Once the form is completed, please review and accept the agreement before submitting the form. If you have multiple vehicles, the form can be submitted multiple times, allowing you to register as many vehicles as you need. The final step is to pick up your new sticker(s) in person at our office. If you are unable to pick up your sticker, please call the office and we can make alternate arrangements with you.

Please note: Staff employed by Temco, Sodexo, or any other outside company may not be able to access the vehicle registration form and will need to come to Campus Safety to manually register their vehicles and collect a sticker.

We recommend all faculty and staff complete the registration process as soon as possible to avoid the busiest time of year in August and September when our office will be issuing parking decals and IDs to the incoming students.


UC AWARDED \$14,780 GRANT FROM SLOCUM-DICKSON FOUNDATION, INC.



Utica College recently received a grant from the Slocum-Dickson Foundation, Inc. for \$14,780 to support advancements in live-patient simulation for nursing students. The grant will allow the College to acquire health education simulation and diagnostic equipment, which will be used with existing technology in the College's nursing education and clinical simulation laboratories and allow nurse educators to provide more comprehensive training and a wider range of clinical learning experiences to nursing students.



The "live, standardized patient" model is among the new advancements that will greatly benefit UC nursing students. The model takes on the body language, personality characteristics and reactions that real patients would exhibit in a health care setting. This personalized interaction adds a new dimension to the educational experience in a supervised, safe environment.





In addition, UC theatre majors will be cast as patients in scripted medical scenarios to enable the nursing students to encounter situations that occur in real-life clinical settings.

"With a shortage of nurses throughout the U.S., graduates need to enter clinical settings with increased confidence and competence in performing complex nursing skills," said Cathy Brownell, associate dean of nursing. "One of our highest priorities is to use advanced simulation technology and develop creative educational approaches so that we can continue to provide the level of excellence that students and their employers expect from a Utica College nursing degree. We are so grateful to Slocum-Dickson Foundation for helping us achieve this goal."

Adam Pack, professor of biology, was recently chosen as a 2016 NCAA Division III Faculty Athletic Representative (FAR) Fellow.

Pack, no stranger to athletics, has served as a faculty athletic representative on campus for three years. A long-time sports fan, he was a swimmer at SUNY Binghamton and coached both the swim and water polo teams after graduation.

The FAR Fellows Institute is held annually to provide professional development and leadership training to 30 experienced Division III FARs, in addition to those from independent institutions. This year, attendees will take part in a three-day professional development program at the NCAA national office in Indianapolis, where they will learn best practices, issues surrounding the role and responsibilities of a FAR and leadership skills.

The FAR Fellows Institute was launched in 2010 to increase the effectiveness of FARs at the campus, conference and national levels.

"I'm honored to be selected for this fellowship," said Pack. "It means the NCAA and our administration trust me to take a leadership role in ensuring the highest standards of collegiate athletics are maintained and enhanced are at UC."

literally at our doorstep. This will benefit students as they participate in internships, but also make members of the local business community more accessible to students. Our goal is to equip students with the business knowledge and management skills necessary to have successful careers. What better place to be than in a revitalizing Utica? We have received nothing but positive interest in our move downtown.

Q: What accommodations are being made for the students, faculty, and staff that will be working and studying there?

A: The number one question that comes to every student's mind is, "How am I going to get from Burrstone Road to Clark City Center and back?" We have spent a lot of time making sure that this will not be an issue. There will be a shuttle bus for students that do not have a car. Only undergraduate day classes will be offered downtown at this point, although we hope to eventually have night classes there in the future. From about 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., we will have shuttle busses running from Strebel Student Center to downtown. The exact schedule will be out during the summer so students know the times and there aren't any surprises. If they do have access to a car, there is ample parking downtown. There is space on the street, and we have secured 90 free spots in a parking garage. It's going to be a little bit of an adjustment, but I think students will get used to it pretty quickly. There will also be some food service on the downtown campus. We've been working with Sodexo on that. We really just want students and faculty to feel comfortable down there.

Q: Tell me about the blended MBA program and the state-ofthe-art facilities at the Clark City Center.

A: It all started when Utica College wanted to expand the business programs and offer an MBA. The most logical way to establish this was online. However, many of the faculty, as well as administrators, believe that Utica College's future growth and success is dependent on what is established here in Utica. The problem was that we didn't think that there would be enough students to support an on-ground only program. So, Dean Norrie suggested that we design a program that is accessible to both onground and online students. Therefore, students enrolled in the

blended MBA program have the ability to participate either live on-ground, live remotely, or asynchronously through archived material. Our goal is to provide a single experience regardless of how the student is participating. Many people want an MBA but are hesitant to enter a traditional online program. Our program was developed to address this demand. We developed the blended MBA, which combines some very high-tech classrooms, containing voice-activated cameras, with innovative curriculum. The enrollment for the blended program has exceeded our expectations. It's become very popular, and we are proud of it.

Q: What are your hopes for the future of UC's business programs?

A: We've been talking about possibly getting a second smart classroom, which would ultimately double the number of students who can take part in blended classes each semester. In addition to that, we are looking to expand our graduate programs in a number of different areas. We are also making a number of changes to our undergraduate programs, strengthening our business core and emphasizing concentrations that will provide students with the skills to compete for good paying jobs in the Mohawk Valley and beyond.

Q: Tell me a little about yourself.

A: I've been here for 27 years. I started in 1989, and I really love teaching. I've been kicking around upstate New York my whole life. I grew up just outside of Schenectady. I got my undergraduate degree and my MBA from Cornell University and then went to Syracuse University where I got my Ph.D. I have a wife and three kids. In addition to spending time with my family, I love tennis. But my body isn't aging like I would like it to. I always joke that I'm aging more like milk than wine. I've had a lot of injuries, but I love playing. In terms of my work, I've always wanted to teach in a program and at a school that I could brag about to my neighbors. As I'm nearing the end of my career I can honestly say that Utica College provides students with excellent opportunities to grow, develop, and reach their potential.
