Q. Tell me a little about yourself and how you came to UC.

A. My husband and I were both born and raised in the Rochester area and we raised our five kids in Brockport. Just around the time I interviewed here, my youngest graduated high school. The timing



was just right because all my kids were in different places. I had already met some of the UC nursing faculty including Elizabeth Gleason, associate professor of nursing, and Nancy Vaccaro, assistant professor of nursing, when we attended simulation conferences together. Actually, my first visit to UC was when I first started in simulation. UC had received funding for a stateof-the-art nursing lab. It was one of the most innovative labs in the state. I came on a tour and was incredibly impressed with the facility years before I ever even thought about coming here to teach, which was in July of last year.

Q: Tell us about some of the new technology in the simulation nursing lab.

A. With the continuing nursing shortage, our graduates must enter the health care workforce ready to hit the ground running, with the confidence and the competencies to tackle the rigors of patient care. Using advanced simulation technology to train nursing students in the clinical laboratory is a creative and successful educational approach, and it remains a critical component



Hossein Behforooz, professor of mathematics, presented a talk and a workshop during Public Day about Magic Squares at the Bridges 2016 Conference held at the University of Jyvaskyla, Finland, August 2016.

Berns and co-author G.A. Cordero said their study was the first to support a classic Darwinian example concerning domestication and natural selection.

challenge is to make the simulation as realistic as possible for students. A recent grant from the George I. Alden Trust allowed us to purchase a high-fidelity, technology-enabled patient manikin, named "Lucina." She's lifelike - and she's also a sophisticated computer programmed to mimic a wide range of symptoms and to react realistically to student interventions during training scenarios. Adding Lucina to our clinical simulation laboratory raises the bar on our ability to give nursing students a more comprehensive education and wider range of experiences to fully prepare them for career success. Another grant from the Slocum-Dickson Foundation purchased simulation and diagnostic equipment that will allow us to use live "patient actors" who can take on the body language and physical reactions that real patients would exhibit in a health care setting. It's an approach that used widely in professional health care education, and it adds a new dimension to the educational experience we can provide. One item we purchased with this grant is a chest overlay that a patient actor will wear to help nursing students during tracheostomy training.

Q: How do you think this type of learning benefits students?

A. It's important to know, first of all, that simulation is not just a manikin— it's a method. To really simulate effectively, you have to create a scenario that is realistic. It helps students develop by having a real experience even though it is not a living patient. So, I think the biggest benefit students get from learning in a simulation environment is that when they start working in a hospital or another clinical setting, they aren't doing it for the first time. Students were always able to get

At this year's Convocation ceremony, the Harold T. Clark Jr. Award was presented to David Wittner, professor of history and director of the UC Center for Historical Research. some of these experiences through their clinical training but now we can make sure they've seen and done so much more. For instance, if a student has never seen a patient having heart failure, we can create that in simulation. We can make sure they can recognize it, they know the right way to treat it and they understand how long it will take before the medication becomes effective. If they're going to make a mistake, they can make it on the manikin. There is so much potential in simulation. We start simple and over time, make it more and more complex.

Q: What do you see in the future for UC's nursing program?

A. The College recently purchased three pan-tilt zoom video cameras, which will help capture how students perform in different scenarios. We can go back and point out students' strengths and weaknesses and really help them learn and grow from every experience. We can go back to a specific point in a scenario and say to the student, "Explain what your thought process was as you were making these decisions." Research shows that observing a situation helps people see the bigger picture. Simulation is all about feedback and this is really the ultimate form of feedback. The bottom line is one that is hard to measure: will our students improve the health of the people in their communities? Will they be able to apply what they know, communicate well, think critically and anticipate possible crises? Simulation gives us the chance to uncover gaps and improve by reflecting on the experience as a team. It is a very powerful training tool and I am very thankful for the new simulation space and all our new equipment.


