Making the Move to Google Apps for Education

You may have heard UC is transitioning email and calendar services to Google. Students will receive a notification via UC email letting them know that their account is going to be migrated. During the transition students will need to use a temporary password to access their email (you will use this password for email, banner, library databases and logins with the exception of Angel and campus computer logins). The temporary password will be in your notification email. Once you begin using Google Mail, you can access your email at www.utica.edu/google. Please see the [short online orientation](#) to Google Mail; you will want to turn up your volume for the full presentation.

David Walter, UC graduate student in Cybersecurity and Graduate Assistant at the UC Help Desk, emphasizes that "the main thing you need to know during migration is your temporary password because you will need it to access not only your email but other UC systems as well." Initially Google Mail will look different and take some getting used to, but the layout is very customizable so you can tailor it to your own preferences. Google Labs are one way to customize your email and utilize experimental add-ons to make your experience even better.

Several handy features of Google are Chat, Hangouts (Video), and Drive, which allow for collaboration with other Gmail users such as professors and classmates. Google Drive allows a group to work on a project by housing documents "in the cloud" for easy access,

mobility and collaboration. David says he foresees Google Drive being useful because it "lets you access documents from anywhere with an internet connection so you do not need a flash drive."

You can also add other Google accounts such as a personal Gmail account so that they are only one click away. Calendars can be shared with other Google accounts and synced to your mobile device for on-the-go organization and easy access to multiple calendars in one place. The first week of migration will be an adjustment period, but once Google is tailored to your preferences, it has the potential to be a very useful tool for students. - Your email address stays the same (e.g. username@utica.edu)
- Increased mail quota to 25 GB
- More "up time" (Google has so many servers that it experiences little "down time")
- No time-outs (you can stay on email and not get logged off)
- Conversation mode (grouping of messages and replies in one neat stack)

The Write Idea: Choosing a Topic!

It is important to remember that a thesis or capstone project becomes the culmination of your education and academic experience; therefore it is important to choose a topic wisely and really enjoy it.

It might not seem like it now, but you are capable of completing your thesis or capstone project in a short amount of time. Most Utica College programs have specific courses that guide you through this process, typically over the span of one semester. Once you have chosen a topic, it helps to write out a timeline for completion. Many students feel it is beneficial to start with the date you anticipate graduating and working backwards from there, being sure to adhere to the [graduation deadlines](#).

Throughout your coursework make note of anything that is of interest to you then further delve into the topic through course assignments and in conversation with the professor of the course, your academic advisor, or your thesis or capstone project advisor. Researching prospective topics early allows you to narrow your subject down and gives you the ability to write your thesis or capstone project in the time allotted per program.

If ever you get stuck or need some inspiration, there are many tools and resources available to you. You can search the Utica College Library database for previous theses or capstone projects to get an idea of what past students have researched or just start Googling keywords or phrases. Remember that the entire faculty and staff want you to succeed and will do whatever they can to help!

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
