Internship will be a remote (work from home) position.

Job Title: Communications Intern

Schedule: We ask for a commitment of 8-10 hours/week from September to December. Flexible scheduling is available.

Compensation: This internship position is unpaid. WJCN will, however, work with colleges and universities for interns to receive credit and/or institutional support when possible.
